


The Patrick Power Library is in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People.






## MESSAGE FROM THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARIAN

Library staff provide friendly and supportive assistance to all members of the Saint Mary's community, often going above and beyond to source material, find answers, or assist with research queries.




## **ACCESS SERVICES**

The Library is a service-first organization. At the Circulation Desk, patrons can renew a campus ID card, pick up and check out items, borrow a laptop, book a group study room, add money to a print account, and find an item on reserve for a class.

Individual study carrels, group study rooms, a reading lounge and worktables are disbursed throughout three floors of the Library, providing areas for group discussion, individual study and computing, reading and contemplation.

The Library provides a **Syllabus Service** to assist faculty by locating the most cost-effective and copyright compliant versions of their course materials for student use.




# Collections



In December 2018, the Library hosted approximately 100 guests to celebrate the strong ties between the Halifax Regional Municipality and the city of Zhuhai, China.



### AFRICAN HERITAGE MONTH

In February 2019, Librarian and Archivist Hansel Cook teamed up with Dr. Val Marie Johnson and Dr. Lynn Jones to host a monthlong exhibit of materials, as well as a panel discussion entitled, **"Racial Apartheid & Black Freedom Struggles in Nova Scotia and South Africa"**.

The exhibit highlighted portions of the Lynn Jones collection, which chronicles Black history, civil rights and social justice activism in Nova Scotia.



# **Partnerships**

### WE ARE IN MI'KMA'KI

In October 2018, upon the request of Isaiah Bernard from the Indigenous Student Society, the Library hosted a temporary display of Indigenous cultural materials.

In March 2019, a new permanent display case showcasing Mi'kmaq cultural materials, on Ioan from the Nova Scotia Museum, found a home in the Library. The display was launched on March 8, with a panel discussion about both the artifacts and the partnership between the Library, the Indigenous Student Society and the Nova Scotia Museum.
