MESSAGE FROM THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARIAN

This past year has underlined the significance of the Patrick Power Library's resilience and ability to adapt in the face of a global pandemic. Despite social distancing protocols, mandated lockdowns, and subsequent re-openings, the Library team worked diligently to develop new and innovative ways to ensure access to Library services and collections remained uninterrupted.

Inspired to consider alternate methods of delivery, access to the Library's physical collections was facilitated through services that included curbside pickup and document delivery. Individual study space was offered through an online booking system and a partnership between the Library, Student Services and the VPAR's Office expanded the Library's laptop lending service.

In addition, Research Help was expanded to include online service, and the Copyright team worked to develop a course readings service for faculty. Moreover, a series of modules, offered through Brightspace, on Academic Integrity was developed and piloted.

To learn more about how the Library innovated new services, inspired change and engaged with the Saint Mary's community, I encourage you to read through this 2020-21 Annual Report. These are the accomplishments of a dedicated team of professional librarians and exceptional library personnel.

ACCESS SERVICES

The Library is the academic heart of the Saint Mary's community. Our goal is to help students and faculty connect with the resources they need.

During the COVID 19 pandemic, in accordance with public health measures, library services moved online where possible, providing access to physical library space and collections when safe to do so. For most of the academic year, members of the Saint Mary's community were able to book appointments online to use library study spaces (including computers, printers, scanners, and photocopiers), or to pick up library books and other materials.

ACCESS SERVICES

Library staff provide friendly and supportive assistance to students, faculty, staff and community members.

Additionally, library staff found ways to get materials into the hands of students and faculty, providing interlibrary loan and Novanet Express services electronically.

In partnership with Student Affairs and Services, we were also able to expand our laptop lending program, acquiring more laptops and lending them out to students in need during virtual operations.

RESEARCH & COPYRIGHT SUPPORT

Whether online or in person, library staff help students and faculty access, evaluate, and ethically use a wide variety of research materials.

In 2020-2021, the Library launched a new virtual chat service in order to better connect with and support the Saint Mary's community. Patrons can now access research help via phone, email, text message, online chat or a virtual meeting.

As the university moved to online learning, requests for copyright support from students and faculty soared. In order to answer some common copyright questions related to online learning, Amy Lorencz and Patricia Langille offered the "Copyright@SMU and Online Teaching" Webinar Series in spring/summer 2020.

The Course Readings Service, which helps faculty source copyright-compliant versions of course readings and make them available online, has also been an especially valuable service for the Saint Mary's community in 2020-2021.



EXPANDING ACCESS TO ONLINE RESOURCES

As Saint Mary's moved to virtual operations, the Library found new ways to support teaching and learning.

Based on demonstrated demand, the Library provided students and faculty with the resources they needed, including two new streaming video databases, **Criterion on Demand** and **Audio Cine**, as well as adding numerous ebooks and other online resources to the collection.

COLLECTIONS

We take pride in providing access to a wide range of scholarly research materials in a variety or disciplines to facilitate teaching, learning, and research. This year, during virtual operations, we more than doubled the number of both streaming media and ebook titles in the collection, allowing members of the Saint Mary's community to access many more library materials from home.

ARCHIVES & INSTITUTIONAL REPOSITORY

The University Archives is the institutional memory of Saint Mary's. Each year, more and more digital items are added to the online Institutional Repository, allowing access to archival materials from anywhere in the world.

The ever-expanding Institutional Repository, the digital face of the Archives, continued to see high volumes of traffic in 2020-2021.

Additionally, although access to the physical Archives was limited over the past year due to COVID 19, patrons could still access virtual archival materials and research assistance through librarians and staff. A new digital submission process for theses and dissertations now makes it easier than ever for students to submit their work to the Archives, preserving it as part of the university's history.

TEACHING & LEARNING

Librarians at the Patrick Power Library teach students how to conduct research and help faculty navigate the ever-changing landscape of scholarly communication, publishing, and research data management.

This year, the Library moved the popular **Research Toolkit** workshops online and offered both a spring session (in the usual 4-day format) and a fall session (spread over a number of weeks throughout the term).

Delivered by librarians and staff from Software & Application Support (SAS), the Research Toolkit is a series of advanced research training workshops aimed primarily at research assistants, teaching assistants, and graduate students. 3,270



LIBRARY INSTRUCTION

This graph shows the number of students reached by library/information literacy instruction over the past five years.

This number includes students who participated in ResearchBase, an information literacy assignment designed to teach students basic research skills.

These numbers have remained relatively consistent over the past five years, and in fact saw some growth during virtual operations.

TEACHING & LEARNING

To further support faculty and students in teaching and learning about academic integrity, Heather Sanderson and Cindy Harrigan developed **Academic Integrity**Foundations (AIF) in 2020. AIF is a new, module-based, interdisciplinary Brightspace assignment designed to educate students about academic integrity, including how to avoid mistakes such as plagiarism. Each of the five modules contains a self-testing quiz, and there is a pretest and a graded final test for the whole.

AIF was successfully piloted in winter 2021, with over **460** students completing the modules.





The Library and the Studio for Teaching and Learning teamed up to present the first-ever **Academic Integrity Week** in August 2020. Beginning on Monday, August 17, this week-long webinar series for faculty was facilitated by librarians, Studio staff, and Academic Integrity Officers. Sessions offered useful strategies for preventing and deterring plagiarism and cheating, and provided a platform for discussing issues and concerns around academic integrity in a virtual teaching and learning environment.

The webinars also highlighted the many kinds of support available for faculty at Saint Mary's that can assist with preventing, detecting, and addressing academic misconduct in virtual classrooms.

SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY

In addition to supporting faculty and students' research, librarians actively contribute to the library and information profession through workshops, conference presentations, and scholarly publishing.

Heather Sanderson and Cindy Harrigan worked with colleagues from Dalhousie and MSVU to host the Workshop for Instruction in Library Use (WILU) in the spring of 2021, after it was postponed in spring 2020 due to Covid-19. WILU is Canada's premier conference on information literacy and library instruction.

Heather Sanderson was elected to Senate.

Associate University Librarian **Peter Webster**, alongside colleagues Alicia Urquidi Díaz & Jean-Baptiste Poline, published, "Canadian Data Repository Inventory: A White Paper for Canada's New Digital Research Infrastructure Organization (NDRIO)", in December 2020.

University Librarian **Suzanne van den Hoogen** and Susan Cleyle, University

Newfoundland, published an article in the
Partnership: Canadian Journal of Library and
Information Practice and Research, entitled,

EVENTS & PARTNERSHIPS

The Library works with partners across campus to support student success, including SMUSA, Student Affairs and Services, the Studio for Teaching and Learning, and student societies.

In summer 2020, the Library's in-person Escape Room went virtual! The Outreach & Engagement Team created an online version of the popular in-person library skills-testing game. The new **Virtual Escape Room** saw high rates of completion during Welcome Weeks in September 2020.

This was followed up by Murder in the Library, a virtual, Halloween choose-your-own-adventure activity in October 2020 that taught students how to interact with various online library services through a fun and engaging activity.

The Library also participated in **Jump Start**, an online event created by the Studio to help prepare students for online learning. Librarians provided both a short orientation session and a media literacy workshop to several cohorts of new students via the Jump Start program.

In honour of African Heritage Month in February 2021, we worked with African Nova Scotian/Black Student & Community Liaison Charisma Grace Walker to create a virtual display of ebooks and streaming videos available through the Library. These materials highlighted African heritage and Black history, Black writers and scholars, and the Black experience in Canada and around the world







EVENTS & PARTNERSHIPS

The Library works with partners across the University to support student success, including SMUSA, Student Affairs and Services, the Studio for Teaching and Learning, and student societies.

In an effort to ensure students were well prepared for online research, librarians offered a wealth of virtual instruction support in 2020-2021. These included offering virtual workshops via the **Student Success Workshop** series, in partnership with Student Affairs & Services; and launching **The Librarian is In**, a series of drop-in librarian office hours/workshops, in winter 2021.

Cindy Harrigan continued to partner with the Writing Centre and SMUSA to offer the **Avoiding Academic Mistakes** workshop.






